Four alcoholics and I sat around the dining room table in the home of one of our members. Bob belonged to our homegroup and had a lot of long-term sobriety. We all four laughed as we talked about our journey, some of our favorite moments, and what it was like to get sober. We all gathered for a meeting at Bob's house since his cancer had made it too difficult for him to make regular in-person meetings with our home group. We then had a Big Book study. Just four alcoholics. Bob died shortly after our happy sunny afternoon at his table. Although it has been several years since Bob passed away, I don't think I will forget that day the four of us spent together. I think about that day every time I read Bill W.'s words, ". . . A.A. is more than a set of principles; it is a society of alcoholics in action."

Whether it's sitting around the kitchen table, making a phone call, or hugging another member (in non–Covid times), we don't forget how those moments make us feel. Since service, our third legacy, has such a lasting impact on our lives and recovery, I think it is difficult to overemphasize its importance and value, as well as the joy it brings to our lives.

In AA's Legacy of Service by Bill W., service in its different forms ". . . whether performed by individuals, groups, areas, or A.A. as a whole, is utterly vital to our existence and growth." What a relief it was to me early on that there are so many ways that I can be of service to Alcoholics Anonymous and to the other people in my life today.

In these trying times, I like to ask myself, what have I done today to be of service? Service to my family? Service to the suffering alcoholic? Service to the other people about me? I hope to continue to remember how these questions can help me keep trying to live a life of service to others and to God.

Selection Process:

As you may remember, the Birmingham Intergroup Central Office (BICO) closed a few months ago, and most of the Steering Committee dissolved (See June Pass it On, "Service: Lessons in Spiritual Growth.") Since then, a quorum of previous members agreed to complete their terms. They reopened the office, began revising the bylaws, and elected four new people to complete the present BICO Board of Directors (formerly the Steering Committee).

Though the quorum of previous members chose the new members, the quorum followed a transparent process. They asked applicants to submit service resumes, interviewed all of them, and chose a slate of officers. Each home group then had an opportunity to accept or reject the entire slate.

Election Results:

According to the March 2020 Pass it On mailing list, the Birmingham area had 79 home groups. Of those, 20 accepted the slate, three declined it, and 56 did not vote. Several factors may account for the low number of home group votes: Covid-19 has caused many groups to suspend meetings while other groups have met only on Zoom. Intergroup representatives took election information to their home groups, but if the home groups did not have business meetings, they could not vote. Next Steps:

The election process is not over, however. Three members of the present board will complete their terms on December 31. The entire board will elect new members this fall. If you did not submit a service resume before, now is your chance. (Service History) Past applicants who want to run again do not need to give new paperwork, but they can look forward to being interviewed again.

Newcomers Bring Excitement!

An Excerpt from "Crockett"

Just last month, I realized that newcomers keep me excited about AA. How simple is that? We are all here waiting to see the lights come on in their eyes and the huge grins to appear on their faces when it finally dawns on them! They've been sober a month or six months or a year and they figure out it's a whole lot easier to stay sober than to get sober.

One rainy Saturday in July I met a sponsee for lunch. Newly sober, he seemed to be struggling with the enormity of this program. We discussed it before, during, and after our meal, and he was upset because he thought he would never "get it." I assured him that he would "get it," when he got it. We do not learn this way of living in one day, but over a lifetime.

He was puzzled about when everything would "click," but I am not. Working with new people, seeing them finally "get it," carrying the message to Bradford, and remaining teachable are what keep me fresh in the program. Many people say that the newcomer is the most important person in the room. I cannot wait for my lunch partner to feel that "click," when he sees and feels what I feel about AA.

Family Disease Spaghetti Carbonara (coal miner's wife)

My father was a great improvisational alcoholic cook. He often (drunk or sober) made a version of this for any meal. It is easy comfort food, but everything happens at once, so organize like you were on TV.

Ingredients: (for two people)

Big Skillet

Spaghetti or Linguini

2 or three strips Bacon

Two large eggs

Pure Olive (or other) oil that does not smoke.

Parmesan (or Parmesan/Romano) cheese (1/3 cup + more for the table)

2or 3 Sliced mushrooms, 1 green onion, and whatever seems good

Process

Cut the bacon into small pieces (Chop it if you are patient).

Slice the mushrooms and green onion. Put them aside.

Mix the eggs with about 1/3 cup of the cheese. Set that aside too.

Cook:

Fry the bacon in oil (!) until it is crisp.

Heat the spaghetti water (start it while the bacon cooks).

Cook the pasta. If the bacon is finished, keep the fat hot while the pasta cooks. Add the onion and mushrooms to the bacon pan—just for a minute or so. Do not let the onion get mushy.

Drain the spaghetti and put it into the skillet (if there is room. Otherwise, use the cooking pot)

Mix it with the bacon, fat, and vegetables. Stir in the egg mixture. (The hot fat cooks the eggs.)

Sprinkle cheese and adjust seasonings at the table. Experiment
