If you can't find your cat, get on a Zoom meeting. The cat will show up for the camera. I've seen more cat tails and butts than I care to remember on Zoom meetings in the past few months. There's definitely something magical about Zoom for our fur babies and for me too.

I was reluctant to get on Zoom for a few weeks. At first I was afraid of the technology (What do you mean I've got to learn to do something new?). But then I realized that I desperately needed a meeting, so I put the app on my phone. I joined my first Zoom meeting knowing that nobody could see me. All they could see was this little gray block-like stick figure. I could see and hear the others just fine, and it made me feel like I was in a real AA meeting. When it was my time to share, technology failed me. No matter what button I pushed, nobody could hear me talking. But I was grateful to see and hear what others were sharing, and I got that same sense of ease and comfort that happens at face-to-face meetings. I was hooked.

A tech savvy friend in the Fellowship helped me solve my audio problems, and I joined another meeting the next night. After experiencing the exhilaration of seeing my friends on the Zoom meeting, I went "all in" and activated the video on my phone. The fear of

being live on camera quickly disappeared, and I started feeling that spiritual connection from listening to others share.

In our local Zoom meetings, I've heard people from all over the country share their experience, strength and hope. A friend who lives in Tampa, Florida, and regularly attends several of our local Zoom meetings invited us to join him in Amsterdam, Netherlands, to hear him tell his story. Not only was he an incredible speaker, but hearing the accents of members from the Netherlands, Germany, Ireland Denmark, and several other countries was fascinating. I look forward to hearing him again soon as the keynote speaker for the Bavarian Roundup in Munich. Zoom has made this possible.

The most compelling aspect of Zoom meetings is the response from the newcomers. They seem to feel that same bond I felt in my first AA meeting when sober participants shared about how they got sober and described what worked for them. Hearing the newcomer speak of almost taking a drink but getting on a Zoom AA meeting instead is all the convincing necessary to prove this COVID-19 induced format works. I now include an unstable internet connection as part of trudging "the Road of Happy Destiny," hope to see you on the Zoomer soon, and plan to give you a hug when we get past this pandemic. Until then, keep recovering —and enjoy your cat.

I have been able to attend meetings all over the country through this miracle of modern technology, greeting people from other towns and cities whom I normally would not have met. We survived World War II, Korea and Viet Nam. AA was very new during World War II, and the "old timers" generally didn't have to go off to war during AA's infancy. Now, however, all alcoholics fight this pandemic. Some groups have been able to meet in person, but the majority have not.

The people who know enough to start virtual meetings have done an amazing job in keeping meetings alive. Thanks to them, AA is 85 years old and going as strong as ever. We are even surviving the political and economic turmoil surrounding Covid-19. Hats off to all the people who keep Zoom meetings going!

Birmingham Intergroup Central Office Board of Directors continues to monitor the global COVID-19 pandemic. We understand the need for a local Intergroup Office, but our biggest concern is for the safety of employees, guests, and volunteers.

General Updates:

- The office has begun reopening on a limited schedule. Board Members and volunteers are staffing it now. *(Note: That has now changed!)*
- We ask all visitors who have experienced any symptoms of Covid-19 over the past 14 days to stay out of the office. If you are feeling unwell or have encountered someone positive for Covid-19, please come by after your symptoms have resolved and you have seen your doctor. Dedicated to maintaining a safe environment, we continue to assess the ever-changing impact of COVID-19.
